Editor's Report – *Aurora* Journal 2022/2023 By Dale Jacobsen

It has been a rewarding 12 months as editor of *Aurora* journal, albeit a very steep learning curve. When I took over from our previous editor, David Ellyard, I had to decide whether to remain with the Quark software, or switch to Adobe InDesign. Either choice meant learning from the ground up, so I sought advice from Edgeprint, who have been producing the journal for a good number of years, as well as other professionals in the print and design industry. Without exception, they recommended InDesign. It is a joy to work with this software, and I am pleased to have made the choice.

I also decided, with the changeover of editorship and a new volume number, to bring something of my own design to the journal, whilst keeping many of the established aspects, particularly the font which is kind to older eyes. I did change the colour from black to dark green, in keeping with the overall design colour for the journal. All except two members said they preferred the dark green, so I have decided to stay with this colour.

The most satisfying aspect of being editor is the seemingly endless supply of interesting articles submitted. This has mostly resulted from frequent contact on Facebook. Old and current Antarctic expeditioners respond well to calls for articles, and most are very entertaining, fitting into the 'From the Past' and 'News from Down South' segments. It is also a good opportunity (which I never miss) to promote membership of our Club. The result of this surge in submissions was to increase the page count from 32 to 36, giving more scope for including articles. The cost of postage of the completed journal remains in the same price band.

Due to the unfortunate flooding of Edgeprint's machinery early in 2023, the reproduction of some of the images was not of the standard we expected. This particularly affected Vol 42 no 3 which celebrated Macquarie Island's 75th anniversary. In recognition of the disappointment felt by Club members, Edgeprint offered a discount for the subsequent edition (see figures below). It is my belief that the problem has now been addressed.
